

MINUTES OF THE ANNUAL MEETING, FEB. 4, 2024

- Natasha called the annual meeting to order; unanimously voted in
- All new members since 2019 signing the roster
- Randy Robertson moved to approve the Minutes of 2023; Kevin Butler seconded
- Joyce Barthold moved to approve today's Agenda

Treasurer's Report

- Thoughts from the Treasurer
 - Challenging year \$84K budget deficit
 - Vestry worked to cut costs
 - Maintaining a 60 yr. old building
 - Noted Roberta's 90th birthday with gratitude, raising donations for the church
 - Still far from breaking the deficit, unable to execute the flamingos
 - Thanked Ed Karsh for counting

Highlights

- The fair netted >\$18K
- Berry Bonanza generated \$1,250; Roberta's birthday \$2,600
- Rentals budget doubled (AA, Irish Step, Music)
- Renting parking spots to SHS
- Joined the Electrical program to reduce electrical bill
- Endowment fund has not done well in recent years, but better this past year
- Because of formula, unable to draw from 2022 and will be unable again in 2023; a parish vote would be needed to override
- Snow plow at a minimum
- Solar panels live in late November; savings to come (from George Berger bequest)
- Actuals vs the budget
 - Offerings higher than budgeted (+\$10K)
 - Pledges right on
 - Plate made the biggest difference (parishioners and "pledges")
 - Transfer from endowment \$0
 - Ran car washes before water restriction kicked in
 - Had funds come in from community dinner, moved in to operating budget
 - Property insurance was up a little
 - Utilities went down; rectory below avg.
 - Repairs for the church were lower
 - Rectory repairs were up a little (lights and electrical work)
 - Stokes loan (?) must have missed on the budget
 - Committees/Group spent very little

- Office & Miscellaneous right on track
- Natasha explained that people viewing online are checking us out or are current parishioners who also give
- Reviewed restricted funds and noted Gordon Wing fund was used toward air conditioning in office
- Called out the donation for the Christian Ed Director
- Assets & Liabilities
 - Increase on SS Bank attributed to bequest
 - Fidelity cash reserves up again because of donations made through Fidelity
 - Vanguard is due to market change
 - Assets
 - St. Luke's owns 3 properties: St. Luke's, Rectory and locked land (given via bequest)
 - Chris Dietz working with neighbor who may want to purchase; if not will be donated as preservation land (est. worth is \$30,500)
 - Endowment fund was up
 - Liabilities
 - Paying down Stokes loan
 - · Addressed pre-paid pledges as liabilities
 - Referenced chart that increase in March was due to Doug Hardy bequest; noted concerns on available funds dipping below Restricted beginning in July

Discussion

- Gail Meehan mentioned a note about the "fun" raising fund (\$2,200k vs \$5K)
- Ron Swan noted concerns that attendance is down and impacting plate collections
- Ron Swan asked about battery storage; Natasha said diocese has approved
 - Expected to be 2-3 yr process
 - All applications are in; in holding pattern getting monthly updates
 Marylou Butler asked if it was National Grid or Eversource; Natasha said both
 - Kathy Cerutti shared a similar project she worked on that took 6 years to complete
- Joyce Barthold thanked Mark Buckley for a job well done
- Ed Karsh commented that it cost \$5K previously to run the church; now up to \$6K per week. We cannot operate the church on \$2K/wk
- We have 112 family units; half do not pledge
- How do we get the families into church?
- Mark noted the \$18K in plate for 2024 is a guess

- Cherie asked about outreach to people who could not be here at the meeting to hear Natasha's message; Natasha mentioned sharing copies of her speech and groupings closer to stewardship time in the fall
- Natasha explained the purpose of pledging so that we have an idea of what we will have to run the church

Nominating

- Natasha thanked the officers and continuing vestry members
- Natasha thanked outgoing Vestry members: Shey O'Grady and Co-Warden Chris Dietz
 - Chris expressed what an honor it has been to serve and appreciated all the help and support
- Cherie moved to make Lauren the next warden; Kevin Butler seconded
- Announced 4 oncoming vestry members, Tom Michaud for 1 year and three new members: Jeanne Piers, Pat Ludwig; John McHugh
- Joyce Barthold moved to bring on new members and to re-elect sitting officers and members. Kevin Butler seconded.
- Chris moving onto the endowment committee in the loss of Joe Barthold and Steve Rafferty stepping down; one more person on deck pending approval by their work to ensure no conflict of interest
- Committee heads offered their reports as submitted
 - Suzanna announced her semi-retirement from the Harvest Fair committee

2024 Highlights

- Working on welders for rails; hoping to have them installed within 2 weeks
- Randy Robertson leading the exploration of replacing windows behind the altar
 - Have found people to do the work and waiting for solutions
 - Parish will be able to review designs (hoping for fall)
- While Natasha is on sabbatical, Natasha shared Deacon Phil, John McHugh and Rev. Edwin all cover; Natasha will return 6/17/24
- Pat Ludwig motioned to call meeting to a close; Kevin Butler seconded

Rector's Annual Report for 2024

"Do all things without murmuring and arguing, so that you may be blameless and innocent, children of God without blemish in the midst of a crooked and perverse generation, in which you shine like stars in the world." Philippians 2:14-15

Dear People of St. Luke's Church,

This has been my favorite Bible passage since I was in high school. I was at a party, and the hostess, a classmate, had baked us cupcakes (or since I was in England, they were called Fairy Cakes), and in each one was rolled up a different encouraging Bible passage. As we ate our cakes and found the passages, we read them aloud. (Yes, I am aware on how incredibly saintly that story is! And no, I am not going to tell you about the many Rugby Parties I also attended which fair outbalance the wholesomeness of this party with Bible Passage Fairy Cakes!) It was these two verses from Philippians that I found inside my Fairy Cake. And they struck me then as encouraging and hopeful and they have continued to be my go-to for encouragement throughout the years and I suspect for years to come.

This passage is in part what led me to do a deep dive into St. Paul's letter to the Philippians during my Sabbatical at the start of 2024. This entire letter is one of encouragement to the church and thankfulness to them for remaining faithful even when things were hard. And I feel this is what we all need right now. You need to know the gratitude from me, from the Diocese, and from God, for keeping the faith and the church going in these difficult times of loss, hurt, fear, hatred and the unknown things that lie ahead. The themes of concern and despair have been seen not just in our own church community, but also in the wider church, in our country, and in the world this past year. Which makes it imperative that we also hear of the gratitude for the work we have done in the name of God and the encouragement to continue doing this work of spreading hope, love, mercy, and forgiveness in a hurt and "crooked" world.

I had hoped along, with the Sabbatical planning committee and the Vestry, that 2024 would have been a year of renewal and rejuvenation. However, it seems that was over shadowed by a lot of sadness from grief, transitions, and unexpected tensions that left us feeling uncertain, anxious, worried, hurt, and perhaps at times even a little resentful. This past year, we said goodbye to a number of beloved members of the church including, Nick Waterman, Janet White, Dorothy Faulkner, and Joan Low. We also wished Jean Anderson, our beloved and faithful Music Director of 24 years, a fond farewell in August when she resigned to begin new adventures in her own life. Along with her resignation, a number of choir members also decided it was time for them to step down from their place in the choir, which has limited what the Choir can offer weekly, including musical leadership for the Christmas Eve service. And along with most other mainline churches, we have experienced a sharp decline in attendance overall, but especially of our younger families which in turn led to a scaled back Sunday School and the need for us all to adjust to this new reality.

In the midst of all this, St. Luke's has continued in small and big ways to shine like stars into the "crooked" world, some notable examples of this are:

- the installation of the long awaited and much needed rails to assist with access to the Communion Rail. This improvement, gifted by Jim and Rene Seaton, has given access to God's table for many to come and share with us the nourishing gifts of Christ's body and blood;
- we also had new leadership step up to run our Annual Harvest Fair, and it was another
 hugely successful year for fellowship, and fundraising, as well as increased participation
 of newer members and trying some new ideas;
- the Social Justice Group continued its ministry and through the Sabbatical time with The Rev. Edwin Johnson, who is the Executive Director of Episcopal City Mission, you were able to deepen that commitment and strengthen this work in many fruitful ways;
- the Vestry took a deep look at the Budget, our ongoing massive deficit, and expenses, and vowed to find ways to improve it. At the last Annual Meeting I was asked by them to fully explain the dire situation we faced for 2024 and to ask everyone to dig a little deeper. The results of you all doing just that, along with efforts of the Vestry to make cuts and create new fundraising avenues, like the incredibly successful Trivia Night, they were able to make a significant difference to the deficit, which you can see in the financial reports;
- in August, we welcomed Ruslan Ramazanov as our Interim Music Director and he has
 faithfully learned our hymns, our service music, and worked with our choir members to
 ensure our Sunday music is a true expression of our faith. His willingness to step into
 this new role and to involve other musicians from the parish has ensured that our
 worship is filled with music;
- in the late summer and into the fall we had thoughtful conversations about the immigration housing crisis and how we can help those who are newest to our country without a place to live. This resulted in the incredible offering by the Butlers, of the use of their home for 2 weeks while they were away, so we could house a newly immigrated family of 3 from the Caribbean. The signup list to help make this successful was filled in less than 24 hours, with people giving a wide variety of time and talents. AND we have continued to find ways to support this family as they set up life here in the greater Boston area with clothing drives, Christmas gifts, prayers and support.
- We also collected 175 packages of Holiday napkins for the Scituate Food Pantry in hopes they help make people's holidays a little more joyful. We saw another successful Giving Tree at Christmas. And we enjoyed monthly Community Suppers providing food and fellowship for our Scituate community.

While this was all very visible work, there was also a lot done behind the scenes to plant the seeds that we will grow this coming year. We are coming closer to the final budget for the "Wall of Windows" that needs to be replaced behind the altar. We hope to have numbers to the Vestry by the February Meeting and a plan to the parish shortly thereafter, with hopes for construction to begin in 2025. The Vestry also started planning sessions for the Invite, Welcome and Connect Program to help our parish flourish as an intentionally welcoming community. The full plan will take whole parish commitment to simple tasks that will invite people into our church, welcome them into our community, and connect us more deeply to

each other and to God. You will be hearing more about this at the Annual Meeting and in the weeks to come. We also started to pull together teams to help us look for a new Music Director, as well as, to start the process of honoring targeted bequests from both Dorothy Faulkner for a new sound system in the church, and from the children of The Rev. Ray Low and Mrs. Joan Low for air-conditioning in the Sanctuary. These gifts will also make our church more welcoming and easier to invite and connect with potential new parishioners.

In the wider church, there was also a lot of transition in 2024. In our own Diocese of Massachusetts both our Diocesan Bishop, Alan Gates, and our Assisting Bishop, Carol Gallagher, retired in 2024. We have welcomed our new Bishop, Julia Whitworth, and are eager to see the new energy and light she will shine in our Diocese. As a member of the Transition Committee who helped with the election process and the transition of Bishop Whitworth into our Diocese, I have had a very full schedule throughout the entire year. Yet, I have found this ministry very fulfilling as I have been able to connect with colleagues and ministries in ways that have reminded me that The Episcopal Church does in fact shine like a star in the world. At a national church level we also welcomed a new Presiding Bishop, Sean Rowe, as the 9 year term of Presiding Bishop Micheal Curry came to an end. Both Bishop Whitworth and Presiding Bishop Rowe will usher in creative ways to continue to be church in the "crooked" world. And as of this writing, we are awaiting the announcement of the next Archbishop of Canterbury, who is the person who is the head of the entire Worldwide Anglican Communion, of which The Episcopal Church is a part. I am also honored to have been elected to the Diocesan Standing Committee, which is a committee of 8 lay and ordained people that advise the Bishop on all manner of things. I am confident that this work of ministry will continue to strengthen our church.

I would be very remiss to end this letter without the formal acknowledgement and thanks to The Rev. Edwin Johnson, Dn. Phil Flaherty, and Mr. John McHugh for their worship leadership during my Sabbatical time. I am sure you enjoyed many wonderful sermons and joyful services with the three of them, and I am grateful to them for this gift to the parish in my absence. I am equally grateful to the leadership of Mrs. Erica Pollard and Mrs. Lauren Schlegel, who were faithful Wardens of this church community during the entire year, but most especially during the 4 months of Sabbatical time. Their devout leadership and commitment to see this church continue to shine, has made them nothing less than stars in this church and in the world. I am so glad we will be continuing to do the work of ministry together this coming year.

The reality is, St. Paul's letter to the Philippians reminding us to keep doing the good work of God without grumbling or complaining, but to do it cheerfully and with hope and grace, is still relevant today. While things are still hard, we still struggle with the changes of life and leadership and the unknown - one thing has stayed the same, we, the faithful people of God who believe in Christ's saving acts, still shine like stars in a "crooked and perverse" world. And so, shine we will, as we go into 2025 encouraged by and grateful for the love of God and the many gifts we have to build up the church.

With the help of former warden, Chris Dietz, we were able to sell the Marshfield land early in 2024, which put us in a significantly stronger financial place. Thanks to the careful

stewardship of resources, fundraising initiatives and the generosity of our congregation, we are encouraged by the progress we have made.

The vestry took a day of retreat in the fall, engaging in spiritual reflection while discussing goals for the upcoming three years. This led us to engage in the recent Invite, Welcome, Connect program to brainstorm ways to draw others into our church life.

We came together as a community this year with tough, but thoughtful and productive conversations. From these discussions, we are grateful for the work of the Social Justice Committee and Mary Lou, Kevin, and Lauren Butler for hosting an immigrant family in need, and for our community for providing every detail necessary to make it happen. We worked together to bring hope and help to our community and continue to do so in so many ways. It was the honest feedback of our parish during the brainstorming process that allowed for a plan that would comfortably work for all.

As we look toward 2025, we do so with gratitude for our community. Your generous contributions of time, talent, and treasure have been the highlight of 2024. T St. Luke's Episcopal Church 2024 Year-End Treasurer Report

Thoughts from the Treasurer:

St. Luke's faced a challenging year in 2024. Sound familiar? We faced a \$91K budget deficit. Once again, the vestry put on their thinking caps and looked very hard to find ways to cut costs while maintaining a 60-year-old building and generating more income. However, it was you, the parishioners, who stepped up to close the budget gap. The vestry made an appeal to the congregation early in the year. You graciously increased your pledges a total of almost \$12,000, and non-pledging parishioners donated almost \$20,000. The final deficit was reduced to \$30,000

As always, a special thanks to our counter, Ed Karsch.

- 2. CONTINUED SUPPORT for the needs of our local Indigenous people of Herring Pond Wampanoag Indian tribe
- 3. CONTINUED SUPPPORT for the needs of our LGBTQ people in Scituate with our PRIDE BREAKFAST, held this year on June 28th, which had 4 speakers from the community, including two from the High School. Dutton Hall was full with a lively crowd.
- 4. CONTINUED WORK and SUPPORT for ANYONE who comes to us seeking REFUGE and ASSISTANCE, be they strangers or someone we know. We partnered with ECM to host an immigrant family of 3 people for two weeks of respite while they awaited housing. We are very grateful to MaryLou and Kevin Butler for their generous offering of the use of their house while they were away, so we could provide a safe and comfortable space for the family. We are also very grateful to the large outpouring of support of all kinds to help this family while they were here and since they have moved to Boston. We are happy to report that St. Luke's with the SJG will continue to SUPPORT the two refugee families we have welcomed into this Beloved Community; the Ramazanoff family from Ukraine and the Jean family from the Dominican Republic and Haiti.

The St Luke's Social Justice Group is committed to learning and action on these and any other matters that affect this Faith Community.
